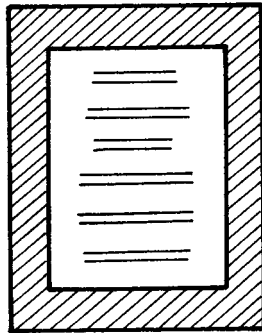

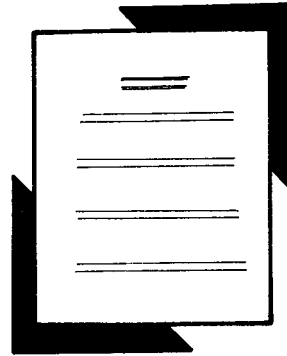
Creative Displays for Children's Writing

Displaying Children's Work

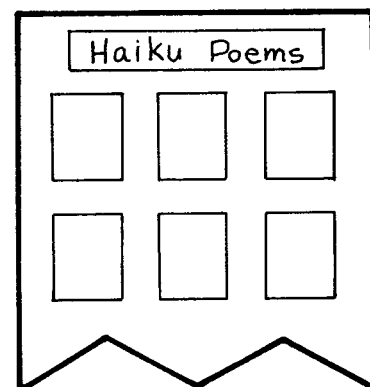
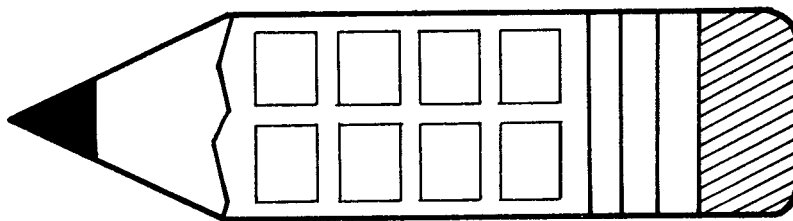


Mount papers on colorful construction paper.



Cut an 8-inch-square piece of colorful construction paper into two triangles. Use to accent children's work.

Display work on colorful banners to hang on doors, walls, and bulletin boards.

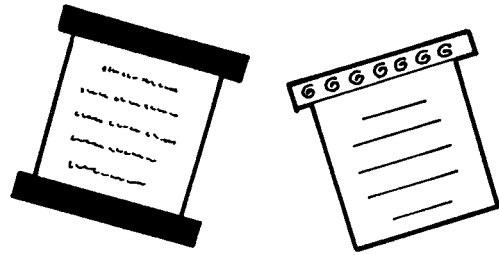

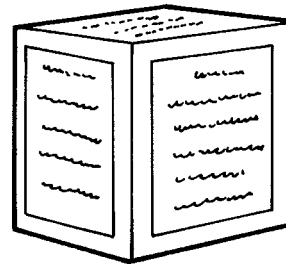
**Add pizzazz to displays!

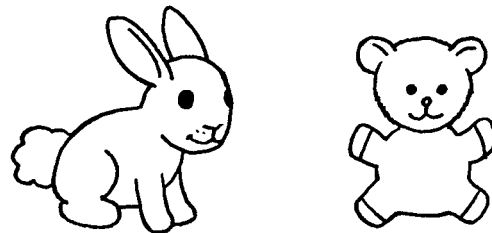
Add colorful strips of construction paper or pieces of bulletin board trimmers to brighten up papers on display!



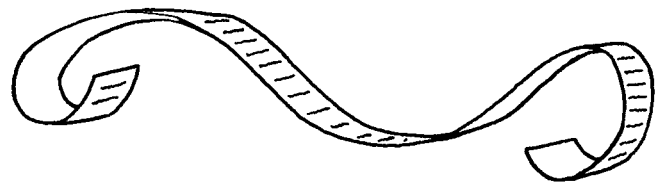
Save cube-shaped tissue boxes. Children can paste their poetry collections on the cubes.



Children can use rubber stamps to add decorative touches to finished papers.



It's fun to write stories or poems on long strips of paper. Cut the strips from bulletin board paper or use rolls of adding machine paper.



Have a date-stamp and stamp pad available. Children love to date stamp their work! If the children's work is on display for a while before being sent home, parents will still know when the work was done.
